**JOHN GOULD** began his career as a violinist in the Sydney Symphony Orchestra in 1958. Since then he has played principal viola with most of Australia's major orchestras and ensembles including contemporary groups.

He has worked and toured with several leading European orchestras including four years with the London Symphony Orchestra and was a founding member of the Carl Pini String Quartet. John has also been extensively recorded by the ABC and has been a concerto soloist with the London and Sydney Symphony Orchestras.

John has given master classes in Europe and America and been a National Music Camp tutor for 13 years. He led the expansion of classical music teaching and performance in Orange as music director of the Orange Regional Music Centre for nine years.

He now resides and teaches in Bega, enthusiastically commuting each weekend to Canberra to continue his role as Director and Conductor of the Maruki Community Orchestra.

#### **PROGRAMME NOTES**

#### Havanaise

Camille Saint-Saëns Soloist **GEORGINA CHAN** 

The Havanaise in E major, Op. 83, is a composition for violin and orchestra based on the habanera rhythm, written in 1887 for Cuban violinist Rafael Diaz Albertini. It is one of the standards of the classical concertante repertoire.

The composition consists of a single multi-tempo movement marked, Allegretto lusinghiero-Allegro-Tempo primo-Allegretto-Allegro non troppo-Più Allegro-Allegretto-Lento.

### William Tell Overture

Gioachino Rossini

The opera William Tell premiered in 1829 and was the last of Rossini's 39 operas, after which he went into semi-retirement, although he continued to compose cantatas, sacred music and secular vocal music. The overture is in four parts, each following without pause. The overture, paints a musical picture of life in the Swiss Alps, the setting of the opera. It was described by Berlioz [who usually loathed Rossini's works] as "a symphony in four parts",but unlike a symphony with its discrete movements, the overture's parts transition from one to the next without any break.

- 1. Prelude, Dawn
- 2. Storm
- 3. Call to the Cows
- 4. Finale, March Of The Swiss Soldiers

#### Violin Concerto No. 1

Max Karl August Bruch Soloist **JOHN GOULD** conducted by **ELISHA ADAMS** 

The concerto was first completed in 1866 and the first performance was given on 24 April 1866 by Otto von Königslow with Bruch himself conducting. The concerto was then considerably revised with help from celebrated violinist Joseph Joachim and completed in its present form in 1867. The concerto is in three movements:

- 1. Vorspiel: Allegro moderato
- 2. Adagio
- 3. Finale: Allegro energico

#### Symphony No. 4

Antonin Dvorák

Dvorák composed his fourth symphony in 1874. It shows an influence of Wagner in its themes' development, and even in its thematic material, i.e. principal theme of the second movement is a near-quotation from Tannhauser, or the Trio section of the third movement includes a vivid reminder of a passage from the Die Meistersinger Overture. The influence of Brahms could also be heard. Both influences will pervade many of his subsequent works. Despite this and other influences Dvorák here shows true mastery in formal compositional aspects and some of his original, unique musical characteristics, which he will develop in his future works.

The first performance took place on May 25, 1874 in Prague, and was conducted by Bedrich Smetana.

The work consists of four movements:

- 1. Allegro
- 2. Andante sostenuto e molto cantabile in B-flat major
- 3. Scherzo (Allegro feroce); Trio in C major
- 4. Finale: Allegro con brio
